## On using NASA's GIOVANNI web tool to create regional-scale time series

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Giovanni is an on-line visualization tool developed and operated by GES DISC. Analyses and visualizations used in this tutorial were produced with the Giovanni online data system, developed and maintained by the NASA GES DISC.

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## How can I use satellite data to rapidly assess NO<sub>2</sub> trends over my area?

### Overview:

Satellite observations can provide useful information on long term changes in air quality. One of the most widely used satellite products is tropospheric NO<sub>2</sub>, which has been retrieved from several different satellite sensors. We provide here a quick tutorial on using Giovanni to analyze an air quality trend in NO<sub>2</sub> data from the NASA Ozone Monitoring Instrument (OMI) sensor, over a region of interest.

### Caveat:

Be sure to select a region that includes multiple OMI pixels. The fewer the number of pixels selected, the more likely the analysis will be influenced by missing data due to cloud screening or other quality controls. Users are advised to carefully consider the quality of the underlying datasets and the associated uncertainty and robustness of any trends calculated using Giovanni.

### Example:

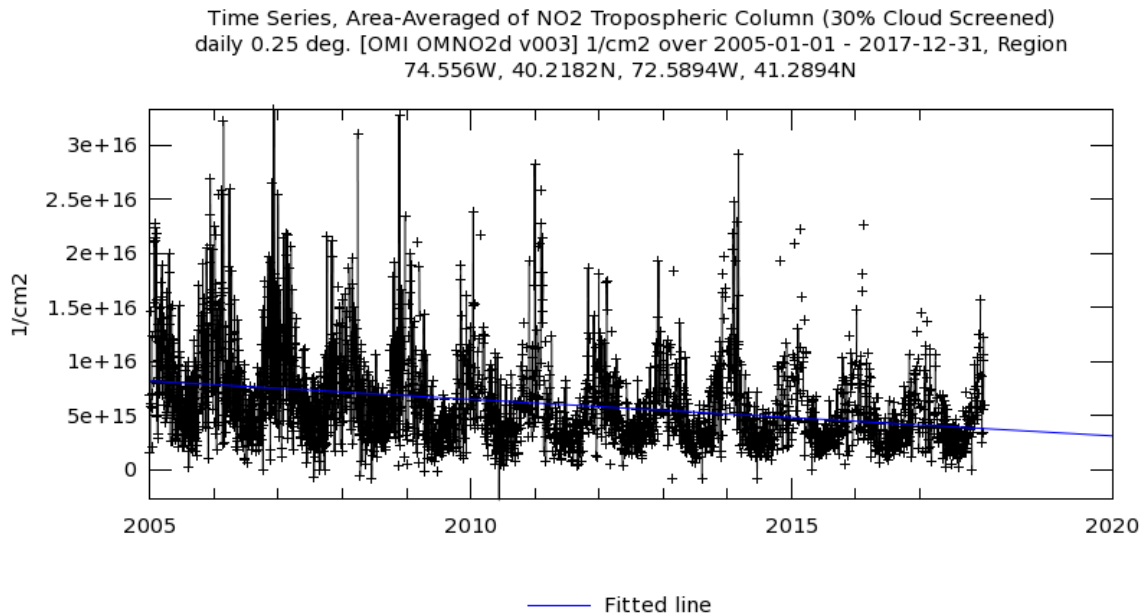


Figure 1. Long-term trend of NO<sub>2</sub> (1/cm<sub>2</sub>) over New York City, NY from 2005 to 2017. The time series was plotted from daily tropospheric column NO<sub>2</sub> (30% cloud screened) from OMI (OMNO2d v003) over a region (74.556°W, 40.218°N, 72.589°W, 41.289°N)

The following example is to show how you can use Giovanni to generate a time series of tropospheric column NO<sub>2</sub> retrieved from OMI over New York city from January 1 2005 to December 31 2017, shown in Figure 1.

### Procedures:

1. If you do not have a NASA Earthdata account,

- Register yourself at NASA: <https://urs.earthdata.nasa.gov/users/new>
  - Link your account to the application named “NASA GESDISC DATA ARCHIVE “ (Read example in <https://disc.gsfc.nasa.gov/earthdata-login> )
2. Go to NASA Giovanni website: <https://giovanni.gsfc.nasa.gov>

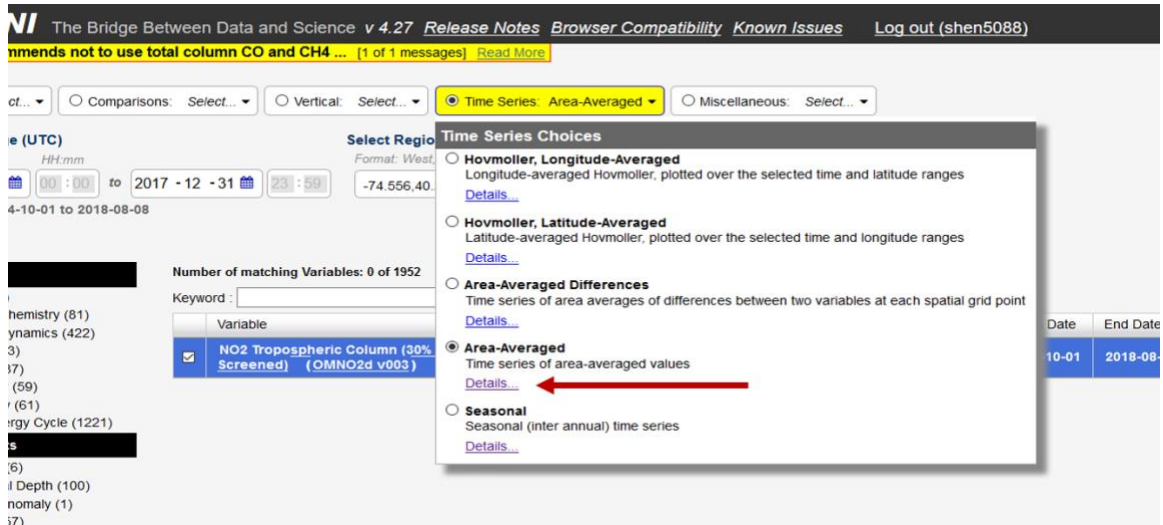


Figure 2. Sample interface to select plot type. Clicking ‘Details ...’ for more information of this plotting type.

  3. **Select Plot.** For the long term trend analysis, you can select “Time Series”, and then “Area Averaged”. Note: You can find out more detail on each plotting function by clicking “Details ...” under the plot function name (Figure 2)

4. **Select Data Date Range.** Here you define the temporal range of your analysis. OMI NO2 are available as daily mean values from October 2004 to present. It is recommended that your analysis time period covering full years of data (e.g., January 1 2005 to December 31 2017) to avoid the influence of the seasonal cycle in the trend. For monthly data, Giovanni has a function to plot the time series for a single month or season by selecting the plot type as ‘Seasonal’

*Note: You will have to wait for a few minutes if your selected range covers multiple years, since it is very time consuming to extract and process large volume satellite data.*

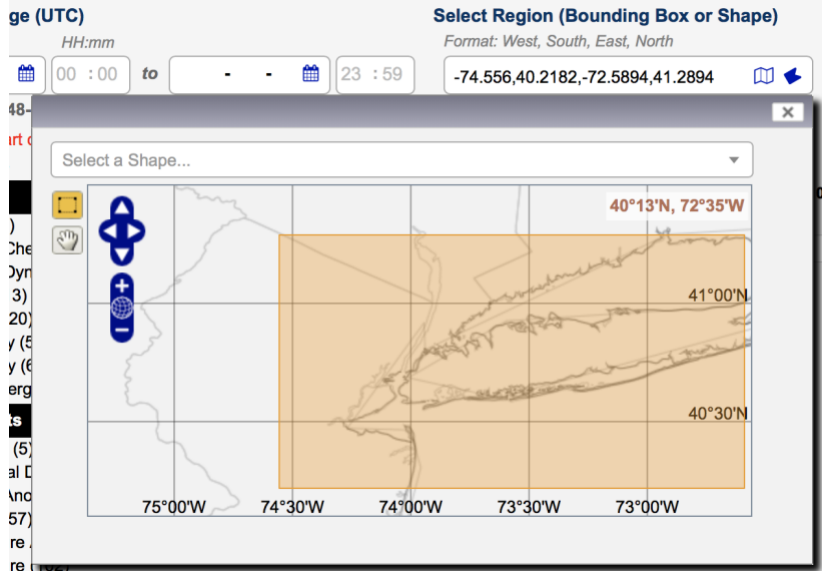


Figure 3. Sample of spatial selection feature in Giovanni system

5. **Select Spatial Region.** You can define the spatial coverage of your city by either giving latitude and longitude coordinates of a box, or selecting the region or Shape using the Map tool (see Figure 3). Use the Zoom In/Out functionality and the Mover (Palm shape button) to choose your city. Since air pollution moves around, it is useful to select an area larger than the city itself. Below is an example for a box (e.g. -74.556,40.2182,-72.5894,41.2894) to define New York City (Figure 3):

6. **Find the right product.** You can choose a product from the categories on the left panel, or use the keyword search function. In this case, we search “NO2” and select the “NO2 Tropospheric Column (30% Cloud Screened)” product (see Figure 4). The other product, “NO2 Total Column”, includes both tropospheric and stratospheric NO2. “30% Cloud Screened” means that only the pixels (satellite data points) with less than 30% cloud cover are considered here. Pixels with more than 30% cloud cover, which interferes with the quality of the retrieval, will be discarded.

**Note:** It is recommended to read the documentation provided from Giovanni. You can mouse-over to see the parameter’s information, or click on the variable (e.g., NO2 Tropospheric Column (30% Cloud Screened) or click on the Product (e.g., OMNO2d\_v003).

7. **Click “Plot Data”**. The system will start to pull off data for you. It may take several minutes, depending on your data range. A good time to get a cup of coffee or do some stretching. You will be able to monitor the progress of this workflow.

Once the job is done, a plot with your time series will show up (See Figure 1).

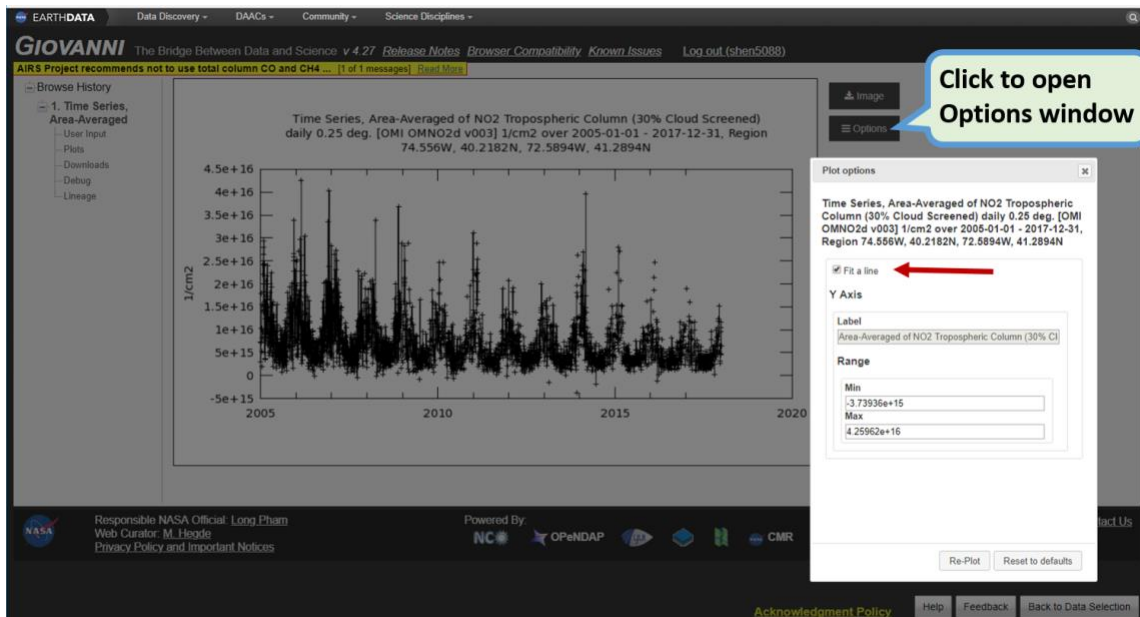


Figure 5. Sample illustration of ‘Options’ window for time series plot: Select ‘Fit a line’ to overlay a linear fitting line.

- There is an option that allows you to overlay a linear fitting line on the time series by clicking the “Options “ on the right side of the plot, and then checking “Fit a line”. You may change the plot title and justify Y-axis range as shown in Figure 5.
- You can save the picture as shown in above Figure 1

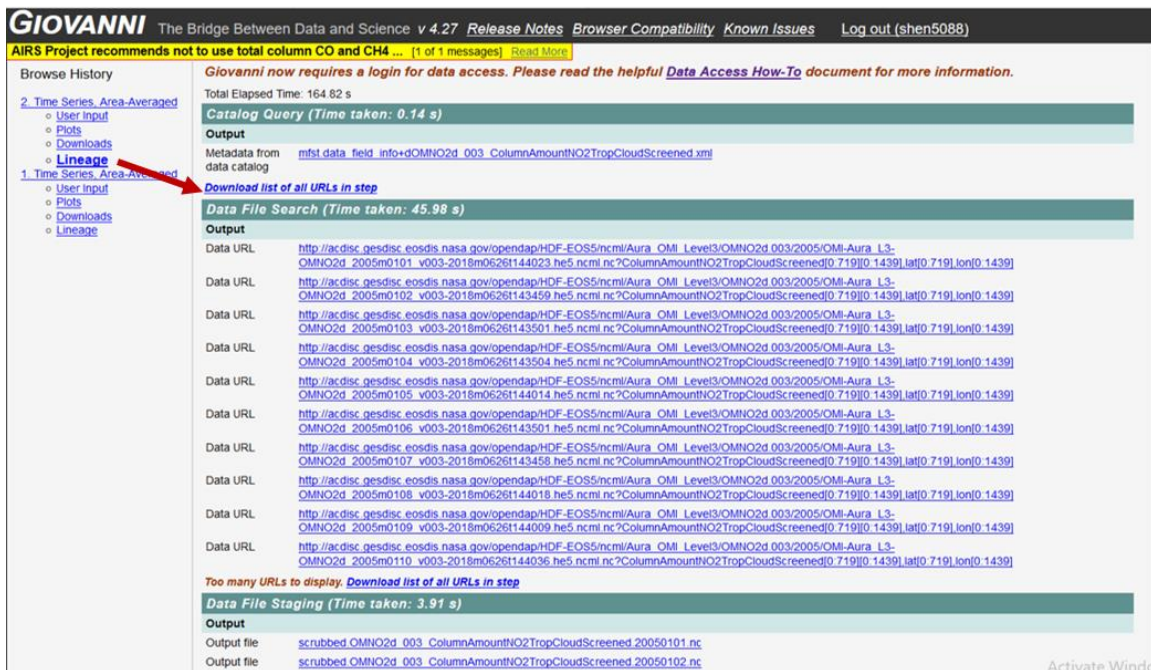


Figure 6. Example of 'Download' page (upper panel) to download time series data and 'Lineage' page (lower panel) to download original and intermediate data.

9. You can also download the raw satellite data or area-averaged daily NO<sub>2</sub> data for New York City from the left panel, see Figure 6 below

- Click “**Downloads**” to download daily NO<sub>2</sub> data (as shown in plot) in ASCII CSV format, or the plot in PNG format.
- Click “**Lineage**” to download URLs to the original archived satellite data under the section “Data File Search”. Note this feature was designed for downloading sample original files to make verification. If interested to download long-term original data from archive, it is better to do the following:
  - go back to ‘User Input’ interface as shown in Figure 4

- Click on the product name in the parenthesis
- Select data access method as 'Subset/Get Data'

10. Bookmarking and data sharing. You can bookmark the analysis, by saving the URL of the Giovanni page at the last step (Step 9). In the future you can always reload this analysis, including all the selections you made through Step 2-7, by copying and pasting the saved Giovanni URL into a browser.

If you like the plot and want to share it with other people, you can also save the URL and they will be able to see your selections and figure. For instance, here is the link of this example:
